1. Call to Order by Mayor Kevin Hammond: (7:00)

Mayor Kevin Hammond called the March 7, 2024 City Council meeting to order followed by Pledge of Allegiance and moment of silence. Council members present were Brent Randolph, Amy Hunter, Tracy Thul, and Jenny Zoglman. Also present were Kimberly McCormick — City Clerk, Kelly McElroy — City Administrator, Tylor Struckman — Water/Wastewater Superintendent, Morgan Koon — City Attorney, John Riggins — Kirkham Michael, Kathy Angulo, Elaine Squires, Belinda Rausch, and Nancy Jackson.

2. Approval of March 7, 2024 Agenda:

Tracy Thul made a motion to adopt the March 7, 2024 agenda, 2nd by Amy Hunter. Vote: 4-0 motion carries.

4. Consent Agenda:

- a. Approval of February 7, 2024 CC Meeting Minutes

Brent Randolph made a motion to approve the consent agenda items a – c, 2nd by Jenny Zoglman. Vote: 4-0 motion carries.

5. New Business:

- a. Request to extend water service-development at 407th & 21st: Owners of the property, Nancy Jackson, Belinda Rausch, and Elaine Squires stated that they would like to put a development on their property located at 407th St W and 21st St N. They were wondering what it would take to have city water in the development. First step is council agreeing to allow the extension of the services, then it would have to go through Department of Ag and KDHE for all the proper permissions. We would not have a cost until engineering was done. Our line runs past the property and it should not be an issue to put connections in. Discussion ensued. *Tracy Thul made a motion to move forward with permission to connect to city water*, 2nd by Amy Hunter. Vote: 4-0 motion carries.
- b. Award contract for Drainage Phase 1: Bid tabs were distributed, discussion ensued. *Brent Randolph made a motion to award bid to Vogts-Parga at a cost of \$90,286, 2nd by Tracy Thul.* Vote: 4-0 motion carries.

- c. CDBG grant for Senior Center: Kelly explained that it was recently discovered that the Senior Center could get access to CDBG funds if they are moved through the City. The Senior Center board and City officials met at the center with a preliminary architect review. For a small amount of money we could have someone write the grant. Tracy Thul made a motion to have Ranson Financial write the grant and the engineering firm write up a design and expected cost, 2nd by Brent Randolph. Vote: 4-0 motion carries.
- d. Council Vacancy: Due to the death of Council Member Mollenkamp there is a vacancy, per statute we have 10 days to appoint. Mayor Hammond would like to appoint Jessica Lyman. Tracy Thul made a motion to appoint Jessica Lyman to fill the vacancy on the council, 2nd by Jenny Zoglman. Vote: 4-0 motion carries.
- e. New Mowers (replacement): Our mower was taken in for service and was stolen from the dealership. Prairieland partners are offering well over book value as a discount toward a new mower. They are offering 2 mowers for what would have been the cost of one. Brent Randolph made a motion to purchase the two mowers at a cost of \$21,734, 2nd by Tracy Thul. Vote: 4-0 motion carries.

6. Old Business:

- a. New Gator maintenance: Discussion ensued. *Brent Randolph made a motion to purchase the new Polaris from Wichita Tractor with a light bar, 2nd by Tracy Thul.* Vote: 4-0 motion carries.
- b. Resolution 227-city sales tax fund distribution: Discussion ensued. *Brent Randolph made a motion to adopt Resolution 227, 2nd by Jenny Zoglman.* Vote: 4-0 motion carries.
- 7. Municipal Court Report: City Attorney Koon advised how he is handling some of the speeding in the school zone tickets. He advised that we will not have court in March due to a conflict.
- 8. Planning Commission: City Attorney Koon stated that the Planning Commission has completed review of residential, commercial and manufactured housing districts of the code. They will move forward with the rest of the code and get is streamlined. The commission is trying to get it in line with what the community would want so that they only need to see something that would may be questionable. He is hoping that by the end of the year we will have a new code ready to go.

RE: March Department Reports and Project Updates

Background:

City staff is pleased to provide the following updates on current projects and initiatives.

Development:

- Housing:
 - <u>Bentwood Addition</u>: There are still a few spec homes for sale in Bentwood Addition constructed by <u>Liberty Communities</u>. Additionally (by Liberty) five new single family home permits have been pulled, as well as a new duplex permit that should begin construction in the next few weeks from <u>C&J Construction</u>! Individual lots remain for sale for custom builds.
 - <u>Pretty Flowers:</u> There is one remaining lot for sale in <u>Trail Ridge at Pretty Flowers</u>
 <u>Addition</u>; as well as two existing homes on <u>Blue Bells Court</u>.
 - on preliminary and final plats, as well as an engineers estimate for the project. Once those numbers are obtained, the next step will be for the City to work with the Developer to complete a development plan/agreement that will be utilized by the Department of Commerce and their Reinvestment Housing Incentive District (RHID) plan. As a reminder, the site is located at the southeast corner of Main and Harry/15th Street; directly to the south of the Senior Center. There have been recent discussions at the Sedgwick County Commission about limitations to the RHID program within Sedgwick County; staff has been participating in these discussions and providing feedback in support of the program, as it was written by the department of Commerce and adopted by the state legislature. This is a valuable development program and opportunity that helps reduce the costs to the developer for build out of the public infrastructure, as well as helps reduce the cost of necessary rent/sale prices for all residents within the development.

Finance:

• Sales tax revenue: March sales tax revenues totaled \$28,614.62, with the City's local 1% portion representing \$11,449.87 of the total amount. This is a decrease of 2.44 % compared to March 2023 total revenues, and a decrease from last month (February 2024) revenues of 35.87%. The following chart represents the City's 1% sales tax collections over the past several months, for ease of reference (note these figures may be different than the total sales tax revenues reported above, as this is just the City's portion). It is not uncommon for sales tax to fluctuate month to month, as retailers have some discretion as to when they report and file their revenues as does the Kansas Department of Revenue (KDOR) as to when they remit revenues back to a City or County.

We are thankful to have diversified our revenues away from total dependence on property taxes and that people are shopping at our local merchants and dining at our local restaurants. In partnership with the Chamber, we continue to promote every available opportunity to shop and support local businesses.

Grants:

- KDHE Waste Tire Grant Application: Picnic Tables/Park Benches: In January staff submitted a grant application to KDHE to fund half the cost of several park benches and picnic tables, both regular and ADA accessible. The total amount of the grant application was approximately \$4,800, with the City providing half of the funds, if awarded. The tables and benches are made in Concordia Kansas, consist of recycled tires, rubber, and plastics, and have an estimated 50 year life span. We are pleased to report that we have been awarded the grant, and expect the contract to arrive on or around May 1st!
- Staff continues to review multiple grant opportunities from both private foundations and public funds, and are still awaiting award or decline notifications from multiple entities at the state and federal levels for items such as the swimming pool, park benches and tables, housing, etc.

Police: GPPD was involved in a week-long program sponsored by both the Police Department and Garden Plain High School. School administration had requested assistance with finding a program that would address and educate the students in the dangers and recognition of Human Trafficking entails and we were able to guide them to the organization that other area school districts utilize.

We are currently investigating two criminal investigations within the city, one which coincides with a similar crime that occurred in Wichita.

Lt. Crownover is on a extended vacation and will return to duty in April. I am receiving assistance from our part-time officer in coverage as he has volunteered to work additional hours. We have unfortunately received no applications from our posting on law enforcement related career listings as well as reaching out to individuals that we believe might be interested. As you know, it is a highly competitive market as well as a smaller pool of those that seek a career in law enforcement. I hear similar stories from other surrounding departments.

Activity: 27 area checks, Wichita ICTSOS Programs at GPHS entailed trafficking crimes/best safety practices all week beginning March 18th, 1 funeral escorts-, 26 building checks, 10 outside agency assists, 11 dispatched calls for Garden Plain (check welfare, calls for service, etc.)

4 VIN inspections. 2 medical calls ,11 traffic stops resulting in 2 citations. 13 citizen assistance requests.

School zone coverage was normal.

We did not have a safety luncheon this past month due to conflicting schedules.

Public Works: Over the past few weeks our teams have worked on the following projects and initiatives.

Parks:

- Oity Park: renovations continue at the pavilions at City Park, and our public works staff is working on rebuilding and repairing the existing picnic tables to coordinate with the new, more modern and subtle color scheme. Additionally, staff removed old plantings near the entrance of City Park and rebuilt planter boxes that will house new seasonal and perennial flowers and bushes to beautify the park entrance.
- Ternes Park: improvements continue at Ternes Park, including the new "Willy Goat" toddler spring toy, and the new tree swing. Additional improvements will continue over the next few weeks including the installation of the new pet waste stations and signage, people and pet watering fountain, and backstop fencing replacement. Other minor improvements will include the installation of new trees to the park, benches, a pavilion for shade, and replacement of the benches in the team areas of the ballfield area.
- Grants for public park improvements: still no word from the federal or state
 governmental entities regarding the grant for the construction of the pool, recycled
 picnic tables/benches, etc. We continue to monitor the awards and announcements, as
 well as additional opportunities.

Streets/Stormwater:

- Work has begun to relocate the gas services lines to a lower level in the "canal" are of Loomis and B street. This was necessary for our partners at Black Hills Energy to complete before we can move forward with the scheduled repairs to the "floodway" to improve water flow in that area of town.
- Annual street crack and edge sealing and asphalt overlay and repairs: Recently the City accepted a bid from SCS Sealing for our annual crack and edging seal and overlay program for maintenance and repairs to City streets and roadways, in the amount of approximately \$37,000, as well as \$12,901 for asphalt repair. Repairs will take place over the next few months and will be focused on the areas of Main and Garnett, with the alternate repairs made to areas of Main Street. This cost was anticipated and included as part of the annual street/General Fund operating budget.

Other:

2024 – 2028 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP): Staff is preparing an updated five-year
 CIP for the 2024-2028 fiscal years. We hope to bring it to you as a first review/read at an upcoming City Council meeting in advance of the annual budgeting process.

RE: Tree City USA Program and 2024 Arbor Day Proclamation

Background:

During the community survey process in 2023, the City received feedback from residents that they would like to see additional trees and greenspaces within the community. One of the very specific requests included improvements to the existing medians on 295th street, such as trees, plants, public art, etc. to improve the City's "gateway" entrance from the interstate. As follow up to this request, staff proposes that Garden Plain pursue becoming part of the "Tree City USA" program and initiating improvements and beautification to the 295th medians. Additional trees are already scheduled to be planted as part of the Ternes Park improvements authorized by the Council in 2023, and plantings will be proposed as part of the new Bentwood Addition Park.

Tree City USA: Founded in 1976 by the Arbor Day foundation, in partnership with the USDA Forest Service and National Association of State Foresters, the Tree City USA program celebrates communities that dedicate time and resources to manage and expand their public tree cover. The program is completely free, and participating in the program on an annual basis makes communities eligible for a Growth Award and other urban forestry opportunities including points toward grant applications for parks and greenspace improvements within the community.

There are four requirements for the program for a community to receive an annual Tree City status. They include:

- 1. Maintaining a tree board or department;
- 2. Having a community (public) tree ordinance;
- 3. Spending at least \$2 per capita annually on urban forestry initiatives; and
- 4. Celebrating Arbor Day.

Garden Plain historically had a tree board that hasn't been active in many years; however, it is not required to be a separate entity. For example, the City Council, EDC, or even the parks/public works department can serve in this capacity. Should the City wish to pursue being a Tree City USA program, a public tree Ordinance will need to be adopted by the City Council at a future meeting. Attachment A is additional information regarding the Tree City USA program.

Arbor Day: Arbor Day is a nationally celebrated observance that encourages tree planting and tree care. The first Arbor Day was celebrated in the state of Nebraska in 1872, in response to a state proclamation urging settlers and homesteaders to plant to provide shade, shelter, fruit, fuel, and beauty for residents of the largely treeless plains. On the first Arbor Day, more than one million trees were planted in Nebraska's communities and on its farms. Today, Arbor Day celebrations are held in communities all over America, with National Arbor Day observed on the last Friday in April. Attachment B is a proclamation declaring Arbor Day as Friday, April 27 in the City of Garden Plain. In addition to the proclamation, staff will reach out to our schools and coordinate some arbor day activities that could include a poster or essay contest and working to plant a tree(s) with the Mayor at one of our City parks.

Financial Implications:

The Tree City USA program is free to participate in, as long as the four qualifying standards are established and observed on an annual basis. According to the Kansas Secretary of State certified populations report for 2023, Garden Plain's population is 943, making the \$2 per capita funding requirement \$1,886 for this calendar year. The cost for the two trees for Bentwood Park are estimated to be approximately \$800; the program also allows for tree trimming, maintenance and removal to be counted toward the per capita investment. Staff is aware that we will need to do some additional tree maintenance in the parks, and if a tree or two is planted in honor of Arbor Day, we are confident that we will more than meet the funding standard.

Recommended Action: The City Council is asked to:

- 1. Consider participating in the Tree City USA Program
- 2. Approve the Arbor Day Proclamation
- 3. Direct staff to draft an Ordinance as required by the Tree City USA program for adoption at the May 1, 2024 meeting.



RESOLUTION 228

A RESOLUTION TEMPORARILY EXEMPTING A CERTAIN PORTION OF THE PUBLIC STREETS FROM THE PROHIBITIONS ON POSSESSION AND CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR OR CEREAL MALT BEVERAGE ON PUBLIC PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF GARDEN PLAIN, KANSAS.

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 41-719(a)(1) generally prohibits consumption of alcoholic liquor on public streets, alleys, roads, or highways; and

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 41-719(a)(2) allows alcoholic liquor to be consumed at a special event held on public streets, alleys, roads, sidewalks, or highways when a temporary permit has been issued pursuant to K.S.A. 41-1201 or 41-2703; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of Garden Plain desires to issue a permit for the consumption of alcoholic liquor pursuant to K.S.A. 41-1201 and at the City of Garden Plain Vintage Market and Concert event between the hours of 9:00 am to 3:00 pm on June 1, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of Garden Plain desires to approve, by resolution, the consumption of alcoholic liquor on public streets, alleys, roads, sidewalks, or highways pursuant to K.S.A. 41-719(a)(3)

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF GARDEN PLAIN, KANSAS:

Section 1: Pursuant to the request by The Garden Plain Vintage Market for a special event and permit, which includes consumption and possession of alcoholic liquor held at the location depicted in **Exhibit A** between the hours of 9:00 am and 3:00 pm on June 1, 2024, is hereby approved.

Section 2: Pursuant to K.S.A. 41-719(a)(2), the blocked area on public streets, alleys, roads, or sidewalks at the location depicted in **Exhibit A** is hereby exempted from the requirements of K.S.A. 41-719(a)(1) from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm on June 1, 2024. During such time, persons who may legally consume alcoholic liquor may do so within the boundaries of such public property for the limited time as prescribed. The blocked area on the public streets, alleys, and roads at the location depicted in **Exhibit A** will be closed to vehicle traffic from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm on June 1, 2024.

Section 3: Temporary permits may be issued either individually or on behalf of any groups or organizations associated with the event, subject to all applicable state statute and City ordinances.

Section 4: The boundaries of the special event depicted in **Exhibit A** shall be clearly marked by signs and barriers identifying the area in which alcoholic liquor may be possessed or consumed at such special event. No drinking will be allowed in vehicles. Any licensed seller of alcohol shall

ensure that no one under the age of 21 is served alcoholic liquor. Attendees shall comply with	all
alcohol laws of the city and State.	

Section 5: This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its approval of the Governing Body of the City of Garden Plain, Kansas.
